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To Broadband, or not to Broadband-that is the Question?

The HRA have been working closely with all Broadband providers, campaigning to get Super-Fast Broadband to the remainder of the village. This article gives the latest status of Broadband in Hempsted and hopefully explain some of the complexities in a simple way.

Why is Broadband Important?

Broadband is important because it provides high-speed, always-on access to the internet, which allows us many benefits:

Education - Broadband provides access to a wide range of free and open educational resources, courses, and platforms.

Healthcare - Broadband enables you to book appointments, request repeat prescriptions, view test results and even have consultations without leaving the house.

Employment - Broadband makes it easier for job seekers to search and apply for jobs, and it helps businesses find a larger pool of candidates.

Social connections - Broadband allows people to stay in touch with a broader social network and foster social supports. It can also help reduce isolation and loneliness. You can also enjoy the Hempsted Village Notice board.

Economic growth - Broadband can

lead to higher incomes, lower unemployment, and economic growth.

Innovation - Broadband can enable innovation by allowing firms to reach new customers online and use big data analytics.

Flexibility - Broadband can allow for more flexible work patterns, such as working from home or on the move.

Kids/Grandkids – Broadband allows our kids and grandkids to stream and watch movies and videos when we need a rest.

Why is it Difficult to Get Good Broadband in Hempsted?

Hempsted is, in effect, an Islandsurrounded by the River Severn to the west and the Gloucester and Sharpness Canal to the east. Each access over the Canal is a swing bridge to allow tall ships to travel along the canal, which means that cables can't be laid over the bridges as they would in other communities. In order to get to Hempsted, you still need to get across the canal and canal laws mean you have to put the cable 10 metres below the canal. A general rule of thumb is, the deeper you put a cable, the more expensive it is to lay; and then it can be cost prohibitive to the company providing the service, and so they may choose not to.

Why do residents of Hempstead experience different broadband speeds?

If you drive down Secunda Way from Sainsburys, you will see on your right-hand side a number of green and grey cabinets. These are broadband cabinets and your house will connect to one of these cabinets. The speed you get will be determined by multiple factors as follows:

How close are you to the cabinet? The further away from the cabinet you are, the slower your speed will be.

The type of cabinet that you connect to. There are two types of cabinet FTTC and FTTP. FTTC means that from your house to the cabinet is a copper link (this is slow). FTTP means that from your house to the cabinet is a fibre link (this is fast). Unfortunately, your house will be connected to one of these cabinets and you cannot change between those cabinets.

When will Openreach give everyone FTTP? (Likelihood of service - **High**)

Openreach, are through the Canal (good news as that is the tricky part), and have advised that they plan to come and convert all their FTTC cabinets to FTTP between October and December 2025 (more good news), so a faster service should be available to most people early in 2026.

When will Virgin Media give everyone FTTP? (Likelihood of service - Low)

Virgin Media, are through the Canal (good news as that's the tricky part), and have advised that they have no plans at this point to come back and serve the rest of the village (bad news part). They have only served half of the

village and this is down to cost. They used a rental agreement with Openreach where they rented some of their underground duct space to lay cables to the newer build houses. The older style houses in the village are serviced overhead or the supplier would need a new dig, which they have deemed to be cost-prohibitive at this point.

When will City Fibre give everyone FTTP? (Likelihood of service - Medium)

City Fibre, are not through the Canal (bad news as that's the tricky part), but have already completed most of the village install, but got a bit stuck between JD Karting and the Hempsted side of the canal, which joins it all together and makes it work. The HRA have offered to support them to get through the canal and they have agreed to come back and finish their build in 2025, so a faster service should be available to most people early in 2026.

What about BT / Sky / EE / others, when will they give everyone FTTP? BT / Sky and others don't have their own network, they rent a line service usually from Openreach and then onward sell it, so for you it will depend on the Openreach status.

Hopefully, this information helps clarify the current situation and provides some positive news to look forward to.

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Electric bikes: licensing, tax & Insurance



certain requirements.

These electric bikes are known as 'electrically assisted pedal cycles' (EAPCs). You do not need a licence to ride one and it does not need to be registered, taxed or insured.

What counts as an EAPC

- An EAPC must have pedals that can be used to propel it.
- It must show either:
- the power output
- the manufacturer of the motor
- It must also show either:
- the battery's voltage
- the maximum speed of the bike
- Its electric motor:
- must have a maximum power output of 250 watts
- should not be able to propel the bike when it's travelling more than 15.5mph

An EAPC can have more than 2 wheels (for example, a tricycle).

Where you can ride

If a bike meets the EAPC requirements it's classed as a normal pedal bike. This means you can ride it on cycle paths and anywhere else pedal bikes are allowed.

Other kinds of electric bike

Any electric bike that does not meet the EAPC rules is classed as a motorcycle or moped and needs to be registered and taxed. You'll need a driving licence to ride one and you must wear a crash helmet.

Getting vehicle approval for your electric bike

An electric bike must be type approved if either:

- it can be propelled without pedalling (a 'twist and go' EAPC)
- it does not meet the EAPC rules

This should have been done by the manufacturer or importer before you bought it. If it's been type approved, it will have a plate showing its type approval number.


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
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Gordon League RFC
